

CREE NEURODEVELOPMENTAL DIAGNOSTIC CLINIC (June 2018)

The Cree Neurodevelopmental Diagnostic Clinic offers assessment and diagnostic services to individuals with special needs. The main purpose of the diagnosis is to identify solutions to help these individuals and their family, at home, at school and in the community.

<p>Dr. Anne-Marie Goyette is a Pediatrician. Her role is to do a medical evaluation including a full physical exam. She evaluates the children for the facial features that are commonly seen in people with FASD. Her role is also to combine the information given from all the assessments to guide the diagnostic process. Finally, Dr. Goyette summarizes all the recommendations and makes the final report.</p>	
<p>Anny Lefebvre is the Diagnostic Team Leader. Anny coordinates the assessment process. She is the main contact person on the diagnostic team and the link between the diagnostic team and the CMC staff.</p>	
<p>Dr. Caroline Zanni is a Psychologist. Dr. Zanni evaluates how children learn, as well as how they process and remember information. She also assesses children's attention and visual spatial skills, as well as looking at everyday living skills.</p>	
<p>Cynthia Miller-Lautman is an Occupational Therapist. Cynthia evaluates how children move and control their body (jumping, running, etc.), as well as how they use their hands (writing, using scissors, etc.). She also assesses how children's brain take in and interpret information from their five senses.</p>	
<p>Lindsay Lapaquette is a Speech-Language Pathologist. Lindsay evaluated how children understand and use words and sentences, as well as their ability to interact with others.</p>	
<p>Catherine Langevin is a Clinical Advisor. Catherine's role is to support the community in identify and implementing services.</p>	

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
